- In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest, select medium size specimens. Do not mix varieties.
- The following factors are generally considered by the judges:
 - Trueness to variety, type. Pick the specimens from one variety.
 - Uniformity in size, shape and color.
 - Select a perfect specimen. Then select others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
 - Protect from dirt, disease, infection and mechanical damage.
 - Condition and maturity. Be sure exhibits are of high quality.
 - Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil with a soft cloth or brush.
 - Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc., should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetables leaving about (2) inches of stem.
- Read premium material. Carefully follow all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, exhibit that number; do not enter four or six. Your exhibit will be disqualified for having a number of specimens other than that stipulated.
- All vegetable entries must be grown by amateurs.
- All general rules must be followed and the judge has the final decision in all exhibits. If a judge decides an entry is not worthy of a ribbon - NO RIBBON WILL BE AWARDED.
- No early removal of exhibits will be allowed. If you can't pick up on Saturday night, please do not enter. After 12:00 Midnight the entry becomes fair property. Premium will be forfeited for early removal.
- The Fair Committee will accept a stamped, self-addressed envelope for payment of premiums.
- Amateurs Only. No Commercial Growers. Commercial Growers grow on 3 or more acres and sold to supplement family income.
